

## ORDINANCE No. 14

### BACHELOR OF LIBRARY & INFORMATION SCIENCE EXAMINATION

1. A candidate who has obtained the Bachelor's Degree of the Pt. Ravishankar Shukla University or a degree recognised as of equivalent thereto shall be eligible for admission to the examination for the degrees of Bachelor of Library & Information Science.

2. He/She shall have prosecuted a regular course of study for not less than one academic year after passing any of the examinations referred to in Rule No. 1

Prosecution of a regular course of study means attendance of 75% of the lectures delivered in each of the written papers of the course of instruction and completing all the sessional Note Books.

3. For admission to the examination, a candidate shall apply to the Registrar of the University on a prescribed form.

4. A private candidate shall not be eligible for admission to the examination.

5. **Scheme of examination:-**

The examination shall consist of two parts namely:

**Part I - Written Papers**

**Part II - Viva-Voce and Sessional work.**

The Sessional work will be evaluated by the teacher concerned and the Head of the Department, The result of the Part-II will be signed by both the internal and external examiners of viva-voce.

The scheme of written papers and Sessional work and the courses of study shall be prescribed every year and indicated in the University prospectus.

6. Marks and classification.

A candidate will be declared successful if he/she obtains at least :

(a) 40% in aggregate of Parts I and II taken together.

(b) 35% in each written paper.

(c) 35% in viva-voce and Sessional work taken together.

7. Division will be awarded on the basis of total marks obtained in aggregate of Part I and II taken together as given below:

- (a) Pass Division 40% or more but less than 50%.
- (b) Second Division 50% or more but less than 60%.
- (c) First Division 60% or more.

8. Notwithstanding anything contained in the aforesaid Ordinance an examinee, who fails in one paper but secures more than the minimum aggregate marks required may have the deficiency of his/her marks in the paper in which he/she fails condoned upto the limit of 5 marks at the rate of 1 mark of every 10 marks earned by the candidate above the minimum aggregate. After condoning the deficiency his/her result shall be declared in the division to which his/her aggregate entitles him/her.

9. It shall be competent for the Kulapati to condone the deficiency of one mark in case the candidate is failing by one mark or missing a division by one mark. Where the deficiency is so condoned, one mark shall nowhere be added.

10. **Re-admission of a failure to the examination.**

A candidate who fails in the examination shall be allowed to appear in a subsequent year without again attending the course of study.

A candidate who fails in the examination but obtains 35% marks in the sessional work will be exempted from appearing in the sessional work in subsequent years. However a candidate will have to appear in Viva-Voce. Marks obtained in the sessional work in the first attempt will be added in the aggregate in subsequent years.

A candidate who fails in the examination and does not obtain 35% marks in the sessional work shall be allowed to appear in a subsequent year with the special permission of the Kulapati provided he/she attends the course for two calendar months preceding the examination and completes all the Sessional Note Books.

11. Transitory Provision-The repealed Ordinance relating to Bachelor of Library & Information Science examination shall remain effective till the examinations of 1974, and this new Ordinance shall be applicable for the examination of 1975.

## ORDINANCE No. 15

### BACHELOR OF JOURNALISM & MASS COMMUNICATIONS

1. The duration of the course of Bachelor of Journalism shall extend for a period of one academic year.

2. (i) A candidate who, after taking his Bachelor's Degree of the University or of any Statutory University in India, has completed a regular course of study in the teaching department of the University or in a College affiliated to the University for one academic year, shall be admitted to the Bachelor of Journalism Examination of the University.

(ii) For admission to the Bachelor of Journalism a candidate shall appear in Admission written test, Admission will be given to those candidates, who will be in merit.

3. The course of studies for this examination shall be in Hindi and as far as possible shall be confined to Hindi News papers, Magazines etc. only.

4. The class shall be held on all working days for at least 2 hours daily in the evening.

5. As for as possible not more than 8 candidates be admitted to this course in a particular year.

6. The examination shall consist of two parts, namely:

Part - I Theory

Part - II Viva-Voce & Practical.

The scheme of papers and the course of studies shall be prescribed each year.

7. In order to be successful in the examination, the examinee must obtain atleast 35 percent marks in each theory paper and 50 percent marks in practical and viva-voce.

Successful candidates who obtain 60 percent or more marks in the aggregate marks shall be placed in the First division, those obtaining less than 60 percent but not less

than 48 percent in the Second division and all other successful candidates obtaining less than 48 percent in the Third division.

8. An examinee who fails in one subject only (theory or practical), may without being required to attend a further course of study in a College be admitted on payment of a fee of Rs. 20/- to the compartmental examination in that subject (theory or practical).

9. Notwithstanding anything contained in the aforesaid Ordinance, an examinee, who fails in one subject but secures more than the minimum aggregate marks required, may have the deficiency of his/her marks in the subject in which he/she fails condoned upto the limit of 5 marks at the rate of one mark for every 10 marks earned by the candidate above the minimum aggregate. This Ordinance does not contemplate the deduction of marks from the aggregate obtained by a candidate.

10. Notwithstanding the provisions of para 9 of this Ordinance it shall be competent for the Kulapati to condone the deficiency of one mark in case the candidate is failing by one mark or missing a division by one mark. Where the deficiency is so condoned, one mark shall no where be added.

Provided that the benefit under para 9 shall not be allowed to enable a candidate to get the benefit under para 10.

11. Transitory Provision - The repealed Ordinance relating of Bachelor of Journalism Examination shall remain effective till the examination of 1974, and this new Ordinance shall be applicable for examination of 1975

## AMENDED ORDINANCE No. 16

### DIPLOMA IN PHONETICS

1. A candidate, who after passing his/her Bachelor's degree or the third year B.E. examination or the First M.B.B.S. examination of the University or of any Statutory University in India, has completed a regular course of study in the teaching department of the University or in any college affiliated to the University for one academic year, shall be admitted to the Diploma in Phonetics examination.

Provided, however, candidates studying for their Post-graduate degree may also join this course simultaneously.

The students of this course will be treated as casual and shall not be entitled to the privileges and facilities accorded to regular students.

2. The examination shall consist for two written papers (each carrying 100 marks) of three hours duration each.

3. The students securing 60% or more marks in the aggregate of the two papers shall be declared to have passed in the First class, those obtaining less than 60% but not less than 48% in the Second class and those obtaining less than 48% but not less than 36% in the Third class.

## AMENDED ORDINANCE No. 17

### DIPLOMA IN NATIONAL LANGUAGES

1. National Languages of India include:

(1) Assamese, (2) Bengali, (3) Gujarati, (4) Hindi, (5) Kannada, (6) Kashmiri, (7) Malayalam, (8) Marathi, (9) Oriya, (10) Punjabi, (11) Sanskrit, (12) Sindhi, (13) Tamil (14) Telugu and (15) Urdu, as specified in Schedule VIII of the Constitution of India.

A candidate may offer one of the Languages for the diploma at a time.

2. A candidate, who after passing his/her Bachelor's degree or the third year B.E. examination or the First M.B.B.S. examination or any equivalent examination, has completed a regular course of study in the University Teaching Department or in any college affiliated to the University for one academic year, shall be admitted to the Diploma in National Languages examination

Provided however, candidates studying for their Post-graduate degree may also join this course and take the examination simultaneously with the other examination.

3. The students of this course will be treated as casual and shall not be entitled to the privileges and facilities accorded to the regular students.

4. The examination shall consist of two written papers (each carrying 100 marks) of three hours duration each. Candidates securing 60% or more marks in the aggregate of two papers shall be declared to have passed in the First class, those obtaining less than 60% but not less than 48% in the Second class and those obtaining less than 48% but not less than 36% in the Third class.

## AMENDED ORDINANCE No. 18

### DIPLOMA IN EUROPEAN LANGUAGES

1. The European Languages shall include English, Russian, German, and French. A candidate may offer one of the languages for the diploma at a time.
2. A candidate, who after passing his/her Bachelor's degree or the third year B. E. examination or the First M.B.B.S. examination or any equivalent examination, has completed a regular course of study in the University Teaching Department or any college affiliated to the University for one academic year, shall be admitted to the Diploma in European Languages examination.

Provided however, candidates studying for their Post-graduate degree may also join this course and take the examination simultaneously with the other examination.

The students of this course will be treated as casual and shall not be entitled to the Privileges and facilities accorded to the regular students.

3. The examination shall consist of two written papers (each carrying 100 marks) of three hours duration each.
4. Candidates securing 60% or more marks in the aggregate of two written papers shall be declared to have passed in the First class, those obtaining less than 60% but not less than 48% in the Second class and those obtaining less than 48% but not less than 36% in the Third class.

## AMENDED ORDINANCE No. 19

### DIPLOMA IN APPLIED ANTHROPOLOGY AND TRIBAL WELFARE

1. A candidate who, after passing his/her Bachelor's degree or the third year B. E. examination or the First M.B.B.S. examination of the University or of any other Statutory University in India, has completed a regular course of study in the teaching department of the University or in a college affiliated to the University for one academic session, shall be admitted to the examination for the Diploma in Applied Anthropology and Tribal Welfare.

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Provided, however, candidates studying for their Post-graduate degree may also join this course simultaneously.

The students of this course will be treated as casual and shall not be entitled to the privileges and facilities accorded to regular students.

2. The examination shall consist of three papers (each carrying 100 marks, as follows :-  
Paper I - Applied Anthropology.  
Paper II - Tribal Welfare.  
Paper III - (a) Research Techniques and (b) Field Report. Each consisting of 50 marks. The paper on section (a) i.e. Research Techniques will be of 50 marks and will be of 2 hours duration.
3. Candidates securing 60% or more marks in the aggregate of the three papers shall be declared to have passed in the First division, those obtaining less than 60% but not less than 48% in the Second division and those obtaining less than 48% but not less than 36% in the Third division.



## ORDINANCE No. 20

### MASTER OF PHILOSOPHY IN INDUSTRIAL SOCIOLOGY, LABOUR WELFARE AND PERSONNEL MANAGEMENT

1. A candidate who, after taking his Master's degree in Sociology of the University or an examination recognised by the University as equivalent thereto, has prosecuted the prescribed course of study as a regular student of the University for one academic year, shall be admitted to the examination of Master of Philosophy in Industrial Sociology, Labour Welfare and Personnel Management.

2. The course will consist of four theory papers and a Field Report. as follows:-

- I. Sociology of Industry 100 Marks
- II. Techniques of Social Investigation and Social Statistics 100 Marks.
- III. Industrial Administration and Personnel Management 100 Marks
- IV. Labour Welfare and Social Security. 100 Marks
- V. Field Report. 200 Marks.

3. Those candidates who have secured at least 36% of the aggregate of the theory papers and in the field project separately shall be declared successful at the examination. Candidates obtaining 60% marks or more in the total aggregate shall be declared to have passed with merit,

4. Each candidate will have to do regular practical work in the field as directed by the Head of the Department. The practical not-book will periodically be evaluated by the supervisor in consultation with the Head of the Department. This evaluation will carry a total of 50 marks. Each candidate will prepare a report of his field project. Three typed copies of the report will be submitted to the Department not less than two weeks before the commencement of the theory papers. The report shall carry 150 marks. Each report will be evaluated by an internal and an external examiner. Both of them will award marks out of 75 marks each.

REVISED ORDINANCE No. 21  
(As per State U.G.C. Scheme)

BACHELOR OF SCIENCE

1. The three-year course has been broken up into three Parts.  
Part-I known as B.Sc. Part-I Examination at the end of the first year.  
Part-II known as B.Sc. Part-II Examination at the end of the second year and  
Part-III known as B.Sc. Part-III Examination at the end of the third year.
2. A candidate who after passing (10+2) Higher Secondary or Intermediate Examination of C.G. Board of Secondary Education, Raipur or any other examination recognized by the University or C.G. Board of Secondary Education as equivalent thereto, has attended a regular course of study in an affiliated College or in the Teaching Department of the University for one academic year shall be eligible for appearing at the B.Sc. Part-I examination.
3. A candidate who after passing B.Sc. Part-I examination of the University or any other examination recognized by the University as equivalent thereto, has attended a regular course of study for one academic year in an affiliated college or in the Teaching Department of the University shall be eligible for appearing at the B.Sc. Part-II examination.
4. A candidate who after passing B.Sc. Part-II examination of the University has completed a regular course of study for one academic year in an affiliated college or in the Teaching Department of the University shall be eligible for appearing at the B.Sc. Part-III examination.
5. Besides regular students, subject to their compliance with this Ordinance, ex-student and non-collegiate students shall be eligible for admission to the examination as per provisions of Ordinance No. 6 relating to Examinations (General).

Provided that non-collegiate candidates shall be permitted to offer only such subjects/papers as are taught to the regular students at any of the University Teaching Department or College.

6. Every candidate for the Bachelor of Science examination shall be examined in:
  - i Foundation Course:
  - ii Any one of the following combinations of three subjects:
    1. Physics, Chemistry & Mathematics.
    2. Chemistry, Botany & Zoology.

3. Chemistry, Physics & Geology.
4. Chemistry, Botany & Geology.
5. Chemistry, Zoology, & Geology.
6. Geology, Physics & Mathematics.
7. Chemistry, Mathematics & Geology.
8. Chemistry, Botany, & Defence Studies.
9. Chemistry, Zoology & Defence Studies.
10. Physics, Mathematics & Defence Studies.
11. Chemistry, Geology & Defence Studies
12. Physics, Mathematics & Statistics.
13. Physics, Chemistry & Statistics.

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14. Chemistry, Mathematics & Statistics.
15. Chemistry, Zoology & Anthropology.
16. Chemistry, Botany & Anthropology.
17. Chemistry, Geology & Anthropology
18. Chemistry, Mathematics & Anthropology
19. Chemistry, Anthropology & Defence Studies
20. Geology, Mathematics & Statistics.
21. Mathematics, Defence Studies & Statistics.
22. Anthropology, Mathematics & Statistics.

24. Zoology, Botany & Anthropology.

(iii) Practicals in case prescribed for core subjects.

7. Any candidate who has passed the B.Sc. examination of the University shall be allowed to present himself for examination in any of additional subjects prescribed for the B.Sc. examination and not taken by him at the degree examination. Such candidate will have to first appear and pass the B.Sc. Part I examination in the subjects which he proposes to offer and then the B.Sc. Part-II and Part-III examination in the same subject. Successful candidate will be given a certificate to that effect.

8. In order to pass at any part of the three-year degree course examination, an examinee must obtain not less than 33% of the total marks in each subject/group of subjects. In subject/group of subjects, where both theory and practical examination are provided, an examinee must pass in both theory and practical parts of the examination separately.

9. Candidate will have to pass separately at the Part-I, Part-II and Part-III examination. No division shall be assigned on the result of the Part-I and Part-II examination. In determining the division of the Final examination, total marks obtained by the examinees in their Part-I, Part-II and Part-III examination in the aggregate shall be taken into account. Candidate will not be allowed to change subjects after passing Part-I Examination.

Provided in case of candidate who has passed the examination through the supplementary examination having failed in one subject only the total aggregate marks being carried over for determining the division shall include the actual marks obtained in the subject in which he appeared at the supplementary examination.

10. Successful examinees at the Part-III examination obtaining 60% or more marks shall be placed in the First division, those obtaining less than 60% but not less than 45% marks in the Second division and other successful examinees in the Third division.

## USE OF CALCULATORS

The Students of Degree/P.G. Classes will be permitted to use of Calculators in the examination hall from annual 1986 examination on the following conditions as per decision of the standing committee of the Academic Council at its meeting held on 31-01-1986

1. Student will bring their own Calculators.
2. Calculators will not be provided either by the university or examination centres
3. Calculators with, memory and following variables be permitted +, -, x, % square, reciprocal, exponents log, square root, trigonometric functions, viz, sine, cosine, tangent etc. Factorial summation, xy, yx, and in the light of objective approval of merits and demerits of the viva only will be allowed.

MASTER OF SCIENCE EXAMINATION

1. The examination for the degree of Master of Science shall consist of two parts -

- (a) The Previous Examination; and
- (b) The Final Examination

2. A candidate who after obtaining the degree of Bachelor of Science of the University or an examination of any Statutory University in India which has been recognized by the University as equivalent to the B.Sc. degree of the University and has completed a regular course of study for one academic year in a teaching department of the University or in a college affiliated to the University, shall be admitted to the Previous Examination for the degree of Master of Science. A candidate after passing a graduate examination under 11+3 scheme or any other examination recognized by the University as equivalent thereto shall be eligible for admission to a post graduate course of studies where graduation is minimum qualification only after passing One Year Bridge Course prescribed for the purpose. This shall apply to student graduating in 1991 examination.

Provided, however, every candidate shall offer for the Previous examination one of the subjects offered by him/ her for his/her B.Sc. degree. However, a candidate passing B.Sc. with any of the subject prescribed for the examination, will be eligible to offer Anthropology as one of the subjects at the Previous Examination.

Provided further (i) for admission in M.Sc. Previous (Physics) a candidate must have offered Maths as one of the subjects in B.Sc., (ii) for admission in M.Sc. Previous (Chemistry) preference will be given to those who have offered Maths as one of their subject in B.Sc. for admission in M.Sc. Previous Electronic(s) a candidate must have offered Mathematics & Physics at the B.Sc. level.

3. A candidate who, after passing the M.Sc. Previous Examination of the University, has completed a regular course of study for one academic year in a teaching department of the University or in a college affiliated to the University shall be admitted to the Final Examination for the degree of Master of Science in the subjects in which he/she has passed the Previous Examination.

A candidate who has passed the Previous Examination for the degree of Master of Science of another University, may also be admitted to the Final Examination for the degree of Master of Science obtaining previous permission of the Kulpati, provided he offered for his Previous Examination a course of study of an equivalent



standard with almost identical syllabus as is required for the Previous Examination of this University and has attended a regular course of study for one academic year in a teaching department of the University or in a college affiliated to the University.

4. The Examination shall be partly by means of papers and partly practical including sessionals, except in the case of Mathematics where the Examination shall be by means of paper only.
5. Besides regular students and subject to their compliance with this Ordinance, ex-students and non-collegiate candidate shall be eligible for admission to the Examination as per provision of Ordinance No. 6 relating to Examination (General). A candidate securing 60% or more marks in the M.Sc. Previous Examination will be eligible to offer "dissertation" in lieu of one of optional papers for the Final. A regular candidate can offer dissertation with the permission of the Professor and Head of Department of his institution, while a private candidate will have to secure the prior permission in writing of any of the Professors of the subject working in an institution within the jurisdiction of the University and will work under supervision of that Professor after obtaining prior permission of the University to that effect.

Provided that non-collegiate candidates shall be permitted to offer only such subject/ papers as are taught to the regular students at any of the University teaching department or college.

6. The subject of Examination shall be one of the following:
  - (i) Mathematics
  - (ii) Physics
  - (iii) Chemistry
  - (iv) Zoology
  - (v) Botany
  - (vi) Geology
  - (vii) Bio-Science
  - (viii) Statistics
  - (ix) Anthropology
  - (x) Defence Studies
  - (xi) Micro Biology
  - (xii) Electronics
  - (xiii) Biochemistry
  - (xiv) Biotechnology
  - (xv) Rural Technology
  - (xvi) Herbal Science & Technology
  - (xvii) Anthropology & Tribal Studies

Any candidate who has passed the M.Sc. Examination of this University in any subject shall be allowed to present himself in Examination in any one or more of the optional papers in the subject not taken by him at the said Examination and if successful, will be given a certificate to that effect.

Provided that no candidate shall be allowed to offer more than two additional papers in any one year and in subjects other than Mathematics, a candidate shall undergo a practical test in respect of the paper concerned.

7. For both the Previous and Final Examinations a candidate will be declared successful, if he/she obtains at least 36% of the aggregate marks in the subject. A candidate is required to pass in the Practical Examination separately by obtaining not less than 36% marks.
8. The division in which a candidate is placed shall be determined on the basis of aggregate marks obtained in the total of the M.Sc. Previous and M.Sc. Final Examinations. No division will be assigned on the Previous Examination.
9. Successful candidates who obtain 60% or more of the aggregate marks shall be placed in the First Division; those obtaining less than 60% but not less than 48% in the Second Division; and all other successful candidates obtaining less than 48% in the Third Division.
10. Candidate who have passed in the M.Sc. Examination of the University in any subject in Third or Second Division and desire to appear at the M.Sc. Examination in the same Subject for improving Division may without attending a regular course of study in a college affiliated to the University or in a Teaching Department of the University shall be allowed to appear at the aforesaid Examination as non-collegiate students on the following conditions :
  - (i) There shall be only two Divisions for such candidates i.e. First Division and Second Division. The marks required for obtaining these divisions shall be the same as prescribed in the Ordinance i.e. examinees who are successful in Final of the Examination and have obtained 60% or more of the aggregate in total of the marks in the Previous and Final of the Examination taken together shall be placed in the First Division and examinees who are successful in Final of the Examination and have obtained less than 60% but not less than 48% marks in the Previous and Final of the Examination taken together shall be placed in the Second Division.
  - (ii) The results of the candidates obtaining less than 48% of the aggregate marks in the Previous and Final of the Examination taken together shall not be declared.
  - (iii) Candidates shall have the option to appear at both the Previous and Final Examination in one and the same year and for being successful at the Examination, the candidate shall obtain 48% of the aggregate marks.

Provided that such candidates who opt to appear in Previous and Final Examinations separately shall have to obtain minimum aggregate required for the

Previous Examination but he will have to obtain atleast 48% in the aggregate of the Previous and Final Examination taken together or else his result will be cancelled.

(iv) The syllabus for the Examination shall be same as prescribed for the year in which examination is held.

(v) Not more than two attempts shall be allowed to such candidates, failure or non-appearance at the Examination after permission has been accorded by the University shall be counted as an attempt.

Provided, however, such candidates who opt to appear at the Previous and Final Examinations separately will be allowed only one attempt at the Previous Examination and two attempts at the Final Examination.

(vi) Candidates who wish to avail the opportunity given in the foregoing paras will have to apply for the permission as required in the Ordinance relating to admission of Non collegiate Students to the University Examination along with requisite Registration Fee.

(viii) In case a student improves his division under the provisions of this para, the fresh degree will be issued after cancelling his first degree.

11. Transitory Provision - The repealed Ordinance relating to Master of Science Examination shall remain effective till the examinations of 1974 and this new Ordinance shall be applicable from the examination of 1975.

#### USE OF CALCULATORS

The students of Degree/ P.G. classes will be permitted to use of Calculator in the examination-hall from annual 1986 examination on the following conditions as per decision of the Standing Committee of the Academic Council at its meeting held on 31-1-1986.

1. Student will bring their own Calculators.
2. BACHELOR OF COMMERCE

1. The three-year course has been broken up into three Parts.  
Part-I known as B.Com. Part-I Examination at the end of the first year.  
Part-II Examination at the end of the second year  
Part-III Examination at the end of the third year.
2. A candidate who after passing (10+2) Higher Secondary or Intermediate examination of C.G. Board of Secondary Education, C.G. or any other examination recognized by the University or C.G. Board of Secondary Education as equivalent thereto, has attended a regular course of study in an affiliated college or in the Teaching Department of the University for one academic year shall be eligible for appearing at the B.Com Part-I examination.
3. A candidate who after passing B.Com. Part-I examination of the University or any other examination recognized by the University as equivalent thereto has attended a regular course of study for one academic year in an affiliated college or in the Teaching Department of the University shall be eligible for appearing at the B.Com. Part-II examination.
4. A candidate who after passing B.Com. Part-II examination of the University has completed a regular course of study for one academic year in an affiliated college or in the Teaching Department of the University shall be eligible for appearing at the B.Com. Part-III examination.
5. Besides regular students, subject to their compliance with this Ordinance, ex-students and non-collegiate students shall be eligible for admission to the examination as per provisions of Ordinance No. 6 relating to Examinations (General).  
Provided that non-collegiate candidates shall be permitted to offer only such subjects/papers as are taught to the regular students at any of the University Teaching Department or College.

6. Every candidate for B.Com. examination shall be examined in subjects as mentioned in the marking scheme and course of studies.
7. A candidate who has passed the B.Com. Part-III examination of the University shall be allowed to present himself for examination in any of additional subjects prescribed for the B.Com. examination and not taken by him at the degree examination. Such candidate will have to first appear and pass the B.Com. Part I examination in the subject which he proposes to offer and then the B.Com. Part-II and Part-III examination in the same subject. Successful candidate will be given a certificate to that effect.
8. In order to pass at any part of the three-year degree course examination, an examinee must obtain not less than 33% of the total marks in each paper/group of subjects. In-group where both theory and practical examinations are provided an examinee must pass in both theory and practical part of examination separately.
9. Candidate will have to pass separately at the Part-I, Part-II and Part-III examination. No division shall be assigned on the result of the Part-I and Part-II examinations. In determining the division of the Final examination, total marks obtained by the examinees in their Part-I, Part-II and Part-III examination in the aggregate shall be taken into account. Candidate will not be allowed to change subjects after passing Part-I Examination.  
Provided in case of candidate who has passed the examination through the supplementary examination having failed in one subject group only the total aggregate marks being carried over for determining the division, shall include the actual marks obtained in the subject group in which he appeared at the supplementary examination.
10. Successful examinees at the Part-III examination obtaining 60% or more marks shall be placed in the First division, those obtaining less than 60% but not less than 45% marks in the Second division and other successful examinees in the Third division.

Calculators with, memory and following variables be permitted +, -,  $\times$ , % square, reciprocal, exponents log, square root, trigonometric functions, viz, sine, cosine, tangent etc. Factorial summation, xy, yx, and in the light of objective approval of merits and demerits of the viva only will be allowed.
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## Ordinance No. 24.

### Master of Commerce Examination

1. The examination for the degree of Master of Commerce shall consist of two parts :-

- (a) The Previous Examination and
- (b) The Final Examination

2. A candidate who, after taking his B.Com. Degree of the University or an examination of any Statutory University in India, which has been recognised by the University as equivalent to the B.Com. Degree of the University and has completed a regular course of study in the teaching department of the University or in a college affiliated to the University, in the subject in which he offers himself for examination, for an academic year, shall be admitted to the Previous examination for the degree of Master of Commerce.

A candidate after passing a graduate examination under 11+3 scheme or any other examination recognized by the University as equivalent thereto shall be eligible for admission to a postgraduate course of studies where graduation is minimum qualification only after passing one year Bridge Course prescribed for the purpose. This shall apply to students graduating in 1991 main examination.

3. A candidate who, after passing the M.Com. Previous examination of the University, has completed a regular course of study for one academic year in a Teaching Department of the University or in a college affiliated to the University, shall be admitted to the Final Examination for the degree of Master of Commerce.

A candidate who has passed the Previous examination for the degree of Master of Commerce of another University may also be admitted to the Final Examination for the degree of Master of Commerce after obtaining necessary permission from the Kulpati provided that he offered for his Previous Examination a course of study of an equivalent standard with almost identical syllabus as is required for the previous examination of this University and has attended a regular course of study for one academic year in a Teaching Department of the University or in a college affiliated to the University.

4. Besides regular students and ex-students and subject to their compliance with this Ordinance, Non-collegiate students shall be eligible for admission to the examination as per provisions of Ordinance relating to admission of non-collegiate students to the University examination.

Provided that non-collegiate candidates shall be permitted to offer only such subjects/papers as are taught to the regular students at any of the University Teaching Department or College.

A candidate securing 60% or more marks in M.Com. Previous examination will be eligible to offer dissertation in lieu of the optional papers for the Final. A regular candidate can offer dissertation with the permission of the Professor and Head



of Department of his institution, while a private candidate will have to secure the prior permission in writing of any one of the Professors of the subject working in an Institution within the jurisdiction of the University and will work under supervision of the Professor after obtaining prior permission of the University to that effect.

5. The scope of the examination shall be determined by the Academic Council and given in the detailed course of studies.

6. A candidate who has passed the M.Com. Examination of the University shall be allowed to present himself for the M.Com. Examination in any one or more of the optional papers not taken by him at the said examination and if successful will be given a certificate to that effect.

No candidate shall be allowed to offer more than two additional papers in any one year.

7. For both the Previous and Final examination, a candidate will be declared successful if he / she obtains at least 36% of the aggregate marks in the subject.

No division will be assigned on the result of the Previous Examination. The Division in which a candidate is placed shall be determined on the basis of aggregate of marks obtained in both, the M.Com. Previous and the M.Com. Final examination.

8. Successful candidates who obtain 60% or more of the aggregate marks shall be placed in the First Division, those obtaining less than 60% but not less than 48% in the Second Division and all other successful candidates obtaining less than 48% in the Third Division.

9. Candidates who have passed the M.Com. Examination of the University in any subject in Third or Second Division and desire to appear at the M.Com. Examination in the same subject for improving division may, without attending a regular course of study in a college affiliated to the University or in a Teaching Department of the University be allowed to appear at the aforesaid examination as non-collegiate students on the following conditions.

(i) There shall be only two divisions for such candidates i.e. First Division and Second Division. The marks required for obtaining these divisions shall be the same as prescribed in this Ordinance i.e. examinees who are successful in Final of the examination and have obtained 60% or more of the aggregate of the marks in Previous and Final of the examinations taken together shall be placed in the First Division and examinees who are successful in final of the examination and have obtained less than 60% but not less than 48% of the aggregate marks in Previous and Final of the examinations taken together shall be placed in the Second Division.

(ii) The results of the candidates obtaining less than 48% of the aggregate marks in Previous and Final of the examinations taken together shall not be declared.

- (iii) Candidates shall have the option to appear at both the Previous and Final examinations in one and the same year and for being successful at the examination, the candidates shall obtain 48% of the aggregate marks.

Provided that such candidates who opt to appear in Previous and Final examinations separately shall have to obtain minimum aggregate required for the Previous examination but he will have to obtain atleast 48% in the aggregate of the Previous and Final examinations taken together or else his result will be cancelled.

- (iv) The syllabus for the examination shall be the same as prescribed for the year in which the examination is held.
- (v) Not more than two attempts shall be allowed to such candidates. Failure or non-appearance at the examination after permission has been accorded by the University, shall be counted as an attempt.

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Provided however such candidates who opt to appear at the Previous and Final examinations separately will be allowed only one attempt at the Previous examination and two attempts at the Final examination.

- (vi) Candidates who wish to avail the opportunity given in foregoing paras will have to apply for permission as required in the Ordinance relating to Admission of non-collegiate students to the University examinations along with requisite Registration Fees.
- (vii) In case a student improves his division under provision of this para, the fresh degree will be issued after cancelling his first degree.

10. Transitory Provision: The repealed Ordinance relating to Master of Commerce Examination shall remain effective till the examinations of 1974, and this new Ordinance shall be applicable for the examination of 1975.

1. The Diploma courses will be of full time one year duration. the eight Diploma Courses will be under Commerce Faculty out of which four Diploma Courses namely - I. Diploma in Business Management, II. Diploma in Material Management, III. Diploma in Industrial Management and Human Relations. IV. Diploma in Marketing Management will be under the Management Board of studies, and four diploma courses namely - I. Diploma in Banking, II. Diploma in Financial Accounting, III. Diploma in Taxation, IV. Diploma in Advertising and Public Relations will be under Commerce Board of Studies.

2. The Diploma courses can be started by colleges having Post Graduate teaching in Commerce and atleast six Teachers in commerce. The maximum number of students in each diploma Course will be 20 for one academic year.

3. A candidate who after taking his/her Bachelors Degree or Master's degree possessing atleast 50% marks in commerce, or any other faculty of the University or any other statutory University in India, has completed a regular course of study in an affiliated college or in the teaching department of the University for one academic year shall be eligible for appearing at the Diploma Examination. Those candidates engaged in research work in Commerce may also join this Course simultaneously. Provision of Ordinance No. 6 will apply to the candidates.

4. The Examinations shall consist of five written papers, each carrying 100 marks of 3 hours duration and internal evaluation of 20 marks in each paper and Viva-Voce test of half an hour duration for each candidate carrying 100 marks, and study report shall carry 100 marks. The candidates will be required to submit the study report based on actual working of 60 days in any Business/Industrial undertaking and on the basis of it he is to submit his study report which will be evaluated by the External and Internal Examiner at the time of Viva Voce jointly. The candidates will be required to submit two copies of the study report through their guide so as to reach the University before the commencement of theory examinations. The study report will be on the subject matters of elective papers opted by the candidate.

5. The scheme of Internal Evaluation for each paper shall be as under :-

I.	Field visit Report to be evaluated by the head of the Department.	05 Marks.
II.	Assignments.	10 Marks.
III.	Term Evaluation (Observation of the subject Teacher)	05 Marks.
	Total Marks of Internal Evaluation of each Paper -	20 Marks.

6. Candidates securing atleast 40% marks in each written paper and 50% marks in each Internal Evaluation, 50% marks in study report and Viva Voce taken together, and 50% marks the aggregate, shall be declared to have passed in second division and those securing 60% or more marks in aggregate shall be declared to have passed in First Division.

A candidate failing at the Diploma Examination will not be required to appear in written paper Internal Evaluation of study Report and Viva Voce provided he/she has secured 50% in that written paper and Internal Evaluation and Viva Voce. However, if a candidate fails to pass in as many as three written papers he will be dropped from the Diploma Course. Those who fail only in one or two Papers will be given two chances to clear the papers.

Matters not provided for in this Ordinance shall be governed by the provisions of General Ordinances. Matters not provided for even in the General Ordinances shall be governed by the order passed by the Vice Chancellor either on a reference made to him or suo moto.

**Ordinance No. 26**  
**Bachelor of Law (LL.B) Examination**

1. There shall be the following three examinations for the degree of Bachelor of Law viz.
  1. LL.B (Part -I) Examination at the end of first year of the course.
  2. LL.B. (Part -II) Examination at the end of second year of the course.
  3. LL.B (Part – III or Final) Examination at the end of third year of the course.
2. These examinations shall be held at Raipur and such other place as the Academic Council or the Executive Council may determine from time to time.
3. Candidate who holds a Bachelor's or Master's Degree with at least 40% marks in the aggregate of the University or an examination recognised equivalent thereto by the University shall be eligible for the admission in LL.B. Part-I class. If students are admitted on the basis of entrance test held by the respective college or by the Teaching Department of University otherwise the percentage should be 45% for admission if such admitted student has prosecuted a regular course of study for one academic year in the University Department of Law or any law college affiliated to the University shall be eligible for admission to LL.B Part -I Examination.

4. Only such person shall be eligible for admission to LL.B (Part -III or Final) Examinations who has passed LL.B Part I and LL.B. Part -II Examinations respectively of this University or of an equivalent University recognised in this behalf and has also prosecuted a regular course of study during the academic year for the proposed examination of this University.

Provided, however, that a student, who after having passed LL.B. (Part- I) or LL.B. (Part-II) Examination from another University, is admitted to LL.B (Part-II) or LL.B. (Part -III) class, as the case may be, shall also be required to pass in those subjects which were included in the syllabus of LL.B Part I or LL.B Part-II of this University but were not prescribed for the corresponding examination of such other University. Such student shall not be declared successful at the LL.B. Part-III or Final Examination until he/she has, in addition to the papers prescribed for the said examination passed in the subjects referred to in this provision.

Provided further that a student, who after having passed LL.B (Part-I) or LL.B (Part-II) Examination from another University is admitted to LL.B (Part-II) or LL.B (Part-III) class as the case may be, may be exempted in the said examination from appearing in those papers/subjects which he/she had offered at his/her previous examination in the other University and had passed therein.

5. (i) Prosecution of a regular course of study for one academic year means atleast 75% attendance of the lectures and tutorials held during the academic session in each subject/paper. The duration of instructions imparted in the College/University, Teaching Department shall be for a minimum period of three hours on each working day and two hundred working days ordinarily in the academic year.

Provided that deficiency in attendance may be condoned on assignment of good cause and in accordance with the provisions of Ordinance No. 6 relating to Examinations (General) to the extent of 66%.

- (ii) The strength of a section in law class shall not exceed 80 pupils.
- (iii) Not with standing anything contained in the foregoing provisions, women candidates residing within the territorial jurisdiction of this University shall be eligible for admission to the examinations to the degree of Bachelor of Laws without prosecuting a regular course of study afore-state, if they are otherwise eligible.

Provided that the attention of woman candidates appearing privately, is drawn to Rule 10 (iii) of the Bar Council of India Rules providing that a degree in Law obtained from any University by private candidates is not recognised for the purpose of enrolment as an advocate.

6. Every candidate for the LL.B (Part-I, Part -II Part-III or Final) Examination shall be examined in the following subjects; -

7. In order to be successful in any of the LL.B Part-I, LL.B. Part -II and LL.B. Part-III (Final) Examination, the examinee must obtain atleast 36% marks in each paper and in the aggregate atleast 48% of the total marks for each examination. Examinees who obtain 60% marks or above in the aggregate of the total marks in all the three examinations taken together shall be placed in First Division and the rest of the successful examinees shall be placed in Second Division.
8. (a) There shall be supplementary examination for each part, in the Faculty of Law, for the following categories of Law students.
- (i) Who obtain 48% marks in the aggregate but fail in one paper only.
  - (ii) Who pass in all papers but fail to obtain 48% in aggregate.
- (b) (i) Students coming under clause (a-i) will be permitted at their option, to appear at next examination in the paper, in which they had failed. They shall be declared to have passed the examination if they obtain minimum pass marks in the said paper.
- (ii) Students coming under clause (a-ii) will be permitted at their option to appear at the next examination not more than two papers in which they had secured the lowest marks. They shall be declared to have passed the examination if they pass in each of the aforesaid papers and the total aggregate of marks (i.e.) taking into account the marks obtained in such papers and the remaining papers of the preceding examination is 48% or more.
- (c) Students who have failed in any one paper only and have-also failed to obtain 48% marks on the aggregate will be permitted at their option to appear at the next examination in the paper in which they had failed. They shall be declared to have passed the examination if they pass in the paper and obtain the total aggregate of Marks (i.e. taking into account the marks obtained in the paper and the remaining papers of the preceding examination i.e. 48% or more.)
9. A candidate who is declared eligible to appear at the supplementary examination in accordance with the provision of para 8 above, shall be eligible for admission to the next higher class. However in case if he fails at the supplementary examination of the lower class his admission of higher class will be treated as cancelled.
10. The award of division, to a candidate who has passed LL.B Part -III examination by appearing at the supplementary examination for any part thereof while being placed in either category as prescribed in clause 8 (a) (i) and (ii) or covered under clause 8 (c) will be made in accordance with the provision of clause 7 of this Ordinance. For the purpose of determining the aggregate, following procedure shall be followed :-
- (a) For the candidate placed in the supplementary examination under category (a) (i) of clause 8 of Ordinance the total aggregate of marks to be carried over for determining the division at the Final examination of the paper in which he appeared at the supplementary examination.



- (b) For the candidate placed in the supplementary examination under category (a) (ii) or covered under (c) of clause 8 of the Ordinance the marks obtained if he passes at that part of the examination (i.e. LL.B Part-I or LL.B Part-II or LL.B Part -III whichever the case may be) will be carried over and taken in to account for determining the division at the final examination.
  - (c) Such a candidate will neither be ranked in the merit list nor shall be entitled to any award.

(As per State U.G.C. Scheme)

BACHELOR OF HOME SCIENCE

1. The three-year course has been broken up into three Parts, Part-I known as Bachelor of Home Science Part-I Examination at the end of the first year.  
Part-II known as Bachelor of Home Science Part-II Examination at the end of the second year and Part-III known as Bachelor of Home Science Part-III Examination at the end of the third year.
2. A candidate who after passing (10+2) or Intermediate examination with Science Subject Home Science group of Science Subjects of C.G. Board of Secondary Education or any other examination recognized by the University or C.G. Board of Secondary Education as equivalent thereto, has attended a regular course of study in an affiliated college or in the Teaching Department of the University for one academic year shall be eligible for appearing at the Bachelor of Home Science Part-I examination.
3. A candidate who after passing Part-I examination of the Bachelor of Home Science examination of the University or any other examination recognized by the University as equivalent thereto has attended a regular course of study for one academic year in an affiliated college or in the Teaching Department of the University shall be eligible for appearing at the Bachelor of Home Science Part-II examination.
4. A candidate who after passing the Bachelor of Home Science Part-II examination of the University has completed a regular course of study for one academic year in an affiliated college or in the Teaching Department of the University shall be eligible for appearing at the Bachelor of Home Science Part-III (Final) examination.
5. Every candidate appearing at the Bachelor of Home Science Part-I, Part-II, and Part-III (Final) examinations shall be examined in subject approved by the faculty and notified as per scheme for the examination concerned.
6. In order to pass at any part of the three-year degree course examination, an examinee must obtain not less 33% of the total marks in each subject/group of subjects. In paper where both theory and practical examinations are provided an examinee must pass in both theory and practical part of examination separately.
7. Candidate will have to pass separately at the Part-I, Part-II and Part-III examination. No division shall be assigned on the results of the Part-I and Part-II examinations. In

determining the division of the Final examination total marks obtained by the examinees in their Part-I, Part-II and Part-III examination in the aggregate shall be taken into account.

Provided in case of candidate who has passed the examination through the supplementary examination having failed in one subject/group only, the total aggregate marks being carried over for determining the division shall include actual marks obtained in the paper/papers in which she appeared at the supplementary examination.

## USE OF CALCULATORS

1. Student will bring their own Calculators.
  2. Calculators will not be provided either by the university or examination centres
  3. Calculators with, memory and following variables be permitted +, -, x, % square, reciprocal, expotentials log, square root, trigonometric functions, viz, sine, cosine, tangent etc. Factorial summation, xy, yx, and in the light of objective approval of merits and demerits of the viva only will be allowed.

## ORDINANCE No. 28.

### BACHELOR OF ENGINEERING (FIVE YEAR INTEGRATED COURSE)

1. The Course of study shall extend over a period of five years of integrated course, including practical training of not less than 12 weeks prescribed in the syllabus for the different branches of Engineering.
2. At the end of each of the five years, there shall be two full examination, the main examination in April/May followed by a General Supplementary Examination in July/August for each of the following examinations viz :-
  - (a) At the end of the first year- Bachelor of Engineering (First year) Examination.
  - (b) At the end of the second year - Bachelor of Engineering (Second year) Examination.
  - (c) At the end of the third year - Bachelor of Engineering (Third year) examination.
  - (d) At the end of the fourth year - Bachelor of Engineering (Fourth year) Examination.
  - (e) At the end of the fifth year - Bachelor of Engineering (Final year) Examination.
3. The Examination shall be conducted by means of written theory papers, practical examination, sessional work done in the college, and periodical tests conducted through out the session.
4. A candidate who, after passing the Higher Secondary Examination of the Chhattisgarh Board of Secondary Education with Mathematics, Physics and Chemistry or any other examination of University or Board in India, recognised by the University as equivalent thereto, has prosecuted a regular course of study in an Engineering College affiliated to the University for one academic year, shall be eligible for appearing at the Bachelor of Engineering (First year) Examination.

5. A candidate who, after passing the Bachelor of Engineering, First year) Examination of the University or its equivalent, has prosecuted a regular course of study in an Engineering College affiliated to the University for one academic year; shall be eligible for appearing at the Bachelor of Engineering (Second year) Examination.

Provided however, a candidate who after-passing Bachelor of Science preliminary Examination (Engineering Group) of this University or any other examination recognised by the University as equivalent thereto or the final three years diploma course examination of Board of Technical Education, C.G. in 1st Division or its equivalent, has prosecuted a regular course of study in an Engineering College affiliated to the University, for one academic year, shall be eligible for appearing at the Bachelor of Engineering (Second year) Examination.

6. There shall be following branches of study for the Bachelor of Engineering (Third, Fourth & Final year) Examinations:-

- (i) Mechanical Engineering
- (ii) Electrical Engineering
- (iii) Civil Engineering
- (iv) Metallurgical Engineering
- (v) Mining Engineering
- (vi) Chemical Engineering
- (vii) Electronics

7. A candidate who after passing the Bachelor of Engineering (Second year) Examination of the University or its equivalent, has prosecuted a regular course or study in a particular branch of study in an Engineering College affiliated to the University for one academic year; shall be eligible to appear at the Bachelor of Engineering (Third Year) Examination in that branch of study.

8. A candidate who, after passing the Bachelor of Engineering (Third Year) Examination of the University in a particular branch of study, has prosecuted a regular course of study in that branch of study in an Engineering College affiliated to the University for one academic year, shall be eligible for appearing at the Bachelor of Engineering (Fourth Year) Examination in that branch of study.

"A candidate who after passing the Diploma in an appropriate branch of the C.G. Board of Technical Education, Raipur or any other examination of any University or Board in India recognized by the University securing atleast 66% marks at this examination as equivalent thereto, has successfully prosecuted a regular course of study to be called Transfer Course, in an Engineering College afflicated to the University for one year, shall be eligible for appearing at the Bachelor of Engineering (Fourth Year) Examination in their respective branch of study.

**Explanation:-**

Successfully prosecution of regular course of study means:-

- (i) has attended requisite number of lecturers and practicals held during the year;
- (ii) has passed the Qualifying Examination (Transfer Course) specially conducted for these students as per permission here-in-after laid for the B.E. Examination.

9. A candidate who, after passing the bachelor of Engineering (Fourth Year) Examination of the University in a particular branch of study, has prosecuted a regular course of study in that branch of study in an Engineering College affiliated to the University for one academic year and has completed the prescribed training, shall be eligible for appearing at the Bachelor of Engineering (Final year) Examination in that branch of study.

10. A candidate shall be admitted to the degree of Bachelor of Engineering after passing the Bachelor of Engineering (Final Year) Examination.

11. Every candidate for the Bachelor of Engineering Examination shall be examined in the subjects as mentioned in the courses of studies to be prescribed for each examination each year.

12. (i) In order to pass at any of the five B.E. Examinations examinee must obtain not less than :-

- (i) 35% of total marks in each paper
- and (ii) 50% of total marks in each practical
- and (iii) 60% of total marks in each sessional



and (iv) 50% of the total aggregate marks of all theory papers, practicals, sessional and periodical tests during the session.

(ii) notwithstanding any thing contained in any of the ordinance, an examinee who fails by a total of not more than 5 marks in not more than two theory papers or one theory paper and one practical or two practicals or in the aggregate only, his such deficiency shall be condoned to enable him to pass at the examination.

“This benefit will also be given to the candidates who avail the benefit of carry over of marks and who are appearing as compartmental candidates.

13. If a candidate fails to secure the minimum pass marks in the sessional, he shall be debarred from appearing in the B.E. Examination.

14. A candidate who fails in an examination but secures minimum pass marks or more in a paper/practical shall be exempted from appearing in such paper/practical at a subsequent examination and will be declared to have passed the examination if he passes in the remaining papers/practicals and aggregate of that examination under the rules in para (12) above.

However, the candidate may be permitted to re-appear for the entire examination (theory/practical). In such cases, the entire result of the previous examination will be treated as cancelled.

For deciding whether a candidate has secured 50% of the aggregate marks obtained in the whole examination the marks of the candidate at the previous examination in the paper/practical or papers practicals in which he is exempted shall be carried over.

15. (i) An unsuccessful examinee who has failed in not more than four theory papers or four practicals or in theory papers and practical not exceeding four taken together shall be placed in the compartment in such theory papers or practicals.

A candidate shall be declared successful at the examination if he obtains at a subsequent examination the prescribed minimum pass marks in such theory papers/practicals in which he has been placed in the compartment and also secures the prescribed minimum aggregate marks for passing.

(ii) If a candidate fails to obtain the prescribed minimum of 50% marks in the total aggregate but pass in all theory papers, practicals, sessional, he shall also be placed in the compartment in not more than two theory papers of his choice. If

the candidate obtains the minimum pass marks in each paper at a subsequent examination and further obtains the minimum total aggregate marks required for passing the examination, he shall be declared successful at the examination.

- (iii) "If a candidate fails to obtain the prescribed minimum of 50% in the aggregate and also fails in not more than one subject, he shall also be placed in compartment in the subject in which he has failed and in 'Aggregate Shortage' he will be permitted to appear in the subject in which he has failed along with one more theory paper of his choice, at the subsequent examination".

16. A candidate placed in the compartment in accordance with provisions of Para 15 above will be allowed to appear in the theory paper or practical concerned at subsequent examination until he clears the compartment. Provided that if he appears in two compartmental papers/practicals and obtains pass marks in only one of them, he will be required to appear only in remaining theory paper or practical in subsequent examination until he clears the compartment in that paper or practical.

17. Notwithstanding any thing contained in Ordinance No. 6 a candidate who is placed in the compartment in accordance with the provisions of Para 15 above, shall be provisionally admitted to the next higher class, provided he has prosecuted a regular course of study in the higher class, for one academic year, for the academic year, he will also be permitted provisionally to appear at the next higher class examination in all subjects and practicals in addition to appearing in the lower class examination in compartmental subjects. However, in case he fails to clear the compartmental subjects of the lower class, his result of higher class examination will be announced as usual, but he will not be eligible to seek admission to the next higher class until he clears the compartmental subjects of the lower class.

However, neither mark sheet nor provisional degree will be issued to a successful candidate of B.E. Final examination unless he clears all the earlier examinations.

Provide that a candidate, who has failed in more than four theory papers or four practicals or in theory papers and practicals exceeding four taken together, shall also be provisionally admitted to prosecute regular course of studies in next higher class to keep term and appear in sessional examination, but he will not be permitted to appear at the next higher class examination in theory and practicals till he either passes

the lower examination or becomes eligible to appear as a compartment candidate as per provisions laid down in Para 15.

18. (a) The division at the examination shall be awarded on the following basis :-  
50% and above but less than 65% of the total aggregate marks, ..... II division.  
65% and above but less than 75% of the total aggregate marks, ..... I division.  
75% and above of the total aggregate marks ..... I division with Honours.
- (b) A candidate, who passes any of the B.E. (I, II, III, IV and V) examination, after veiling exemptions under Para 14 or after being placed in compartment under Para 15 above, shall be placed in the Pass division.

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Provided that a candidate, who passes B.E. I, II, III, IV and V year examination as a compartmental/Supplementary candidate will be awarded division on the basis of aggregate marks arrived at after taking in to account marks secured by him in the compartmental examination.

- (c) Notwithstanding the Provisions in (b) above, if a candidate is placed in the compartment of the B.E. Final year examination in accordance with para 15 (i) above and subsequently passes the examination in the first attempt, only the minimum pass marks in the compartmental subjects will be taken into account for arriving at his total aggregate marks and he will be placed in the division he is entitled to in accordance with Para 18 (a).

Such a candidate will not be ranked nor will be entitled to any award.

19. Transitory Provision: - The repealed ordinance relating to Bachelor of Engineering Examination of 1974 and this new ordinance shall be applicable from the examinations of 1975.

## ORDINANCE No. 29

### MASTER OF TECHNOLOGY IN APPLIED GEOLOGY

1. The examination for the degree of Master of Technology in Applied Geology consist of three parts, viz :-
  1. M. Tech. First Year (Part - I) Examination
  2. M. Tech Second Year (Part - II) Examination and
  3. M. Tech. Third Year (Part - III) Examination.
2. A candidate who, after obtaining the degree of Bachelor of Science with Geology as an elective subject or B. E. in Mining Engineering of the University or an examination recognised equivalent thereto of any Statutory University in India, has completed a regular course of study for one academic year in a teaching department of the University or in a college affiliated to the University, shall be admitted to the Part - I Examination for the degree of M. Tech.
3. A candidate who, after passing the M. Tech. Part-I Examination of the University, has completed a regular course of study for one academic year in a teaching department of the University or in a college affiliated to the University shall be admitted to the Part-II Examination for the degree of M. Tech.
4. A candidate who, after passing the M. Tech. Part-II, Examination of the University, has completed a regular course of study for one academic year in a teaching department of the University or in a college affiliated to the University shall be admitted to the Part-III Examination for the degree of M. Tech.
5. The examination shall be conducted by means of theory papers and practical examination 20% marks in each theory paper and practical will be marked for sessional work.
6. Every candidate for the M. Tech. Examination shall be examined in the subjects as mentioned in the courses of studies to be prescribed for each examination each year.

7. In order to pass in any part of the M. Tech. Examinations, an examinee has to obtain atleast 36 percent marks in the aggregate of theory papers (including sessionals) and 36 percent marks in the aggregate of practicals (including sessionals).
8. The division in which a candidate is placed shall be determined on the basis of aggregate marks obtained in the total of the M.Tech, Part I, II, and III Examinations. No division shall be assigned on the results of parts I and II Examinations.

The division at the Final Examination shall be assigned on the following basis :-

- (i) 60 percent and above of the total aggregate marks. I division.
- (ii) 48 percent and above but less than 60 percent of the total aggregate marks. II division.
- (iii) 36 percent and above but less than 48 percent of the total aggregate marks. III division.
