

ORDINANCE No. 54

(REFERENCE CLAUSE (XIV) OF SECTOIN 37 OF THE ADHINIYAM 1973) COLLEGE DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL

Constitution, Powers and functions of the council in terms of University Grants
Commission scheme

Definition

1. In this Ordinance unless there is any thing repugnant in the subject of contest:

(a) the terms college, Kulpati, Dean of faculties, Principal, Teachers and Registrar will have the same meaning as is given in the C.G. Vishwavidyalaya Adhiniyam 1973 and all Statutes and Ordinance made or to be made there-
under.

(b) Director of the College Development Council means the director of the College development council of the University appointed according to the terms of the University Grants Commission scheme for setting up of such council.

2. College Development Council

There shall be a college development council under the Pt. Ravishankar Shukla University for ensuring proper academic planning and integrated development programmes of affiliated colleges and to provide the colleges necessary help and guidance. It shall serve as a vital link between the University Grants Commission, C.G. Uchcha shiksha Anudan Ayog, University colleges and state Education Department.

3. Jurisdiction

The College Development Council shall have jurisdiction over all the colleges admitted to the privileges of the University under the Adhiniyam.

4. (1) **The college development council shall consist of:**

- (i) The Kulpati (Chairman) Ex-officio
- (ii) The Director of the College Development Council (convener) Ex-officio
- (iii) Two Deans of faculties to be nominated by the Kulpati
- (iv) Two Senior Teachers of the University Teaching Deptt. to be nominated by the Kulpati.
- (v) Eight Principals of the colleges to be nominated by the Kulpati atleast one of whom shall be the Principal of a Girls college and atleast three shall be from amongst the Principals of Private Colleges. (Member)
- (vi) Six teachers of affiliated colleges to be nominated by the Kulpati. (Member)
- (vii) Director of Collegiate Education Govt. of C.G. or his nominee not below the rank of Jt. Director. (Member)
- (viii) One nominee of the C.G. Uchcha Shiksha Anudan Ayog.
- (ix) Registrar. (Member)

(2) The members of the Council other than Ex-officio members shall hold office for a period of two years.

(3) Seven members of the council shall form a quorum.

(4) There shall be atleast two meetings of the council in an academic year which shall be convened by the Director in consultation with the chairman.

(5) The College Development Council may constitute committee or sub-committees as it may deem necessary for the discharge of its functions.

5. **Powers and functions of the college development council**

The college development council shall have the following powers and perform the following functions:-

- (a) Function as a policy making body in regard to proper planning and integrated development of colleges;
- (b) Conduct surveys of all the affiliated colleges, district wise, with a view to preparing and maintaining an upto date profile on each college under university, reviewing gaps that need to be filled for the development of colleges and make such information available — UGC and other concerned bodies;

(c) Advise the university on all matters relating to development of affiliated colleges, such as provision of adequate facilities-academic and physical-for raising the standard of learning, teaching and research and its periodic evaluation for enabling the University to maintain reasonable continuity of policy in regard to development of colleges;

(d) Prepare a perspective plan for the development and opening of new colleges, to enable the University and state education authorities to take long term decisions on the planning and development of colleges and may advise the University on matters relating to different disciplines taught in colleges at different levels of University Education;

(e) Advise the University in regard to rationalisation and implementation of University policy on affiliation of colleges;

(f) Keep close contact with the colleges with a view to helping them in their proper development, selection of teachers student amenities, proper utilisation of grants and efficient implementation of UGC approved projects and reforms viz, examination reform, courses, COSIP, COHSIP, restructuring of courses to make them more relevant and significant not only to students, but also to the region as a whole by assessing social transformation and regional development.

(g) Review the facilities for post-graduate departments of college in terms of the norms prescribed by the UGC, and assist those having the potential of coming upto the norms with a few years;

(h) Help in the selective development of some colleges to remove regional imbalances; and also assist the college to realise their potential and in identification of colleges for autonomous status;

(j) Ensure that the UGC grants released to University for disbursement to colleges are not held/locked up or utilised by the University for specified purposes according to the guidelines laid down by the commission;

(k) Obtain from the colleges and furnish to the commission utilisation certificates and completion documents in respect of UGC grants released/disbursed to colleges through the University, and help in monitoring the UGC Programmes implemented by the affiliated colleges;

(l) Ensure close and continued contact and interaction between the academic faculties at the University teaching departments at the colleges;

- (m) Review the inspection reports of the colleges and suggest remedies for the defects and irregularities reported.
- (n) Perform such other functions as may be prescribed or as may be deemed necessary by the University for advancing the cause of collegiate education, as may be incidental or conducive to the discharge of the above functions.
6. The college development council shall be responsible to the Kulpati and send periodical reports to the U.G.C. about the impact of U.G.C. programmes.
7. The University shall provide for adequate accommodation, furniture and fittings, stationery, typing, machines, roneo facilities, Secretariate and class IV staff and other facilities from its own resources for the efficient and smooth functioning of the College Development Council.

ORDINANCE No. 55

Master of Home Science Examination

1. The examination for the degree of Master of Home Science shall consist of two parts:

- (a) The Previous Examination and
- (b) The Final Examination.

2. A candidate who, after obtaining the degree of Bachelor of Home Science of the University or an examination of any statutory University in India which has been recognised by the University as equivalent to the B.H.Sc. degree of the University and has completed a regular course of study for one academic year in a teaching department of the University or in a college affiliated to the University, shall be admitted to the previous Examination for the degree of Master of Home Science.

Provided, however, every candidate shall offer for the Previous Examination one of the subjects offered by him/her for his/her B.H.Sc. degree.

3. A candidate who, after passing the M.H.Sc previous Examination of the University, has completed a regular course of study for one academic year in a teaching department of the University or in a college affiliated to the University, shall be admitted to the Final Examination for the degree of Master of Home Science in the subject in which he/she has passed the Previous Examination.

A candidate, who has passed the Previous Examination for the degree of Master of Home Science of another University, may also be admitted to the Final Examination for the degree of Master of Home-Science, after obtaining previous permission of the Kulpati provided that he offered for his Previous Examination a course of study of an equivalent standard with almost identical syllabus as is required for the Previous Examination of this University, and has attended a regular course of study for one academic year in a teaching department of the University or in a college affiliated to the University.

4. The Examination shall be partly by means of papers and partly practical including sessionals.

5. The Subject of examination shall be one of the following:-

- (i) Food & Nutrition.
- (ii) Home Management
- (iii) Child Development & family relationship
- (iv) Textile & Clothing.
- (v) Education Extension.

6. In order to pass at any of the Previous or Final examination, an examinee must obtain not less than:-

- (i) 33% in each theory paper and aggregate of 40% in total theory papers.
- (ii) 40% in each practical.
- (iii) 40% for sessionals.

7. The division in which a candidate is placed shall be determined on the basis of aggregate marks obtained in total, the M.H.Sc. Previous and the M.H.Sc. Final Examination. No division will be assigned on the result of the Previous Examination.

8. Successful candidates who obtain 60 percent or more of the aggregate marks shall be placed in the first division, those obtaining less than 60 percent but not less than 48 percent in the second division and all other successful candidates obtaining less than 48 percent in the third division.

9. candidates who have passed the M.H.Sc. examination of the University in and subject in third or second division and desire to appear at the M.H.S.C. examination in the same subject for improving division may, without attending a regular course of study in a college affiliated to the University or in a teaching department of the University be allowed to appear at the aforesaid examination as non-collegiate students on the following conditions:-

- (i) There shall be only two divisions for such candidates i.e. First Division and Second Division. The marks required for obtaining these divisions shall be the same as prescribed in this ordinance i.e. examinees who are successful in final of the examination and have obtained 60% or more of the aggregate marks in

Previous and Final of the examinations taken together shall be placed in the First Division and examinees who are successful in final of the examination and have obtained less than 60 percent but not less than 48 percent of the aggregate marks in Previous and Final of the Examinations taken together shall be placed in the Second Division.

(ii) The results of the candidates obtaining less than 48 percent of the aggregate marks in Previous and Final of the Examinations taken together shall not be declared.

(iii) Candidates shall have the option to appear at both the Previous and the Final Examinations in one and the same year and for being successful at the Examination, the candidates shall obtain 48 percent of the aggregate marks.

Provided that such candidates who opt to appear in Previous and Final examinations separately shall have to obtain minimum aggregate required for the Previous examination, but he will have to obtain atleast 48 percent in the aggregate of the Previous and Final examinations taken together or else his result will be cancelled.

(iv) The syllabus for the examination shall be the same as prescribed for the year in which the examination is held.

(v) Not more than two attempts shall be allowed to such candidates. Failure or non-appearance at the examination after permission has been accorded by the University, shall be counted as an attempt.

Provided, however, such candidates who opt to appear at the Previous and Final examinations separately will be allowed only one attempt at the previous examination and two attempts at the final examination.

(vi) Candidates who wish to avail the opportunity given in foregoing papers, will have to apply for permissions required in the Ordinance relating to Admission of non-collegiate students to the University examinations along with requisite Registration fee.

(vii) In case, a student improves his division under provision of this para, the fresh degree will be issued after canceling his first degree.

ORDINANCE No. 56.

**BACHELOR OF ENGINEERING FOR DIPLOMA HOLDERS
IN MINING AND METALLURGY (TRANSFER COURSE - 3
YEARS COURSE)**

1. The Course of study shall extend over a period of three years, including practical training of not less than 12 weeks prescribed in the syllabus for the different branches of Engineering.

2. At the end of each of the Three years, there shall be two full examinations, the Main examination in April/May -----by a General Supplementary Examination in July/August for each of the following examinations viz :-

(a) At the end of First Year of the Transfer Course Bachelor of Engineering (Third year) Examination.

Note: B.E. 3rd years Mining/Metallurgical Engineering the pass on will join the main examination in fourth year.

(b) At the end of the second year of the Transfer Course Bachelor of Engineering (Fourth Year) Examination.

(c) At the end of the Third Year of the Transfer Course Bachelor of Engineering (Final Year) Examination.

3. The examination shall be conducted by means of written theory papers, practical examination, sessional work done in the college, and periodical tests conducted through out the session.

4. For transfer course there shall be following branches of study for the Bachelor of Engineering. (Third, Fourth & Final Year) examinations - Mining & Metallurgy.

5. A candidate who after passing Final Examination of Diploma in Mining/Metallurgy from C.G. Board of Technical Education or any Board recognized by C.G. Board of Technical Education as its equivalent has prosecuted a regular course of study in the particular branch of study in an Engineering College affiliated to the University, for

one academic year shall be eligible to appear at the Bachelor of Engineering (Third year) Examination in Mining/Metallurgy branch of study.

6. A candidate who, after passing the Bachelor of Engineering (Third Year) Examination of the University Particular Branch of study has prosecuted regular course of study in that branch of study in Engineering College affiliated to the University for one academic year, shall be eligible for appearing at the Bachelor of Engineering (Fourth Year) Examination in Mining/Metallurgy Branch of study.

7. A candidate who, after passing the Bachelor of Engineering (Fourth Year) Examination of the University in the particular branch of study, has prosecuted a regular course of study in that branch of study in a engineering college affiliated to the University for one academic year and has completed the prescribed training shall be eligible for appearing at the Bachelor of Engineering (Final year) examination in Mining/Metallurgy branch of study.

8. A candidate shall be admitted to the degree of Bachelor of Engineering after passing the Bachelor of Engineering (Final year) Examination.

9. Every candidate for the Bachelor of Engineering examination shall be examined in the subjects as mentioned in the Courses of studies to be prescribed for each examination each year.

10. (I) In order to pass at any of the Three B.E. Examination an examinee must obtain not less than :-

(i) 35% of total marks in each paper and

(ii) 50% of total marks in each practical and

(iii) 60% of total marks in each sessional and

(iv) 50% of the total aggregate marks of all theory papers, practicals, sessionals and periodical tests during the session.

(II) Notwithstanding any thing contained in any of the Ordinance, an examinee who fails by a total of not more than 5 marks in not more than two theory papers or one theory paper and one practical or two practicals or in the

aggregate only, his such deficiency shall be condoned to enable him to pass at the examination.

11. If a candidate fails to secure the minimum pass marks in the sessionals, he shall be debarred from appearing in the examination.

12. A candidate who fails in an examination but secures minimum pass marks or more in a paper/practical shall be exempted from appearing in such paper/practical shall be exempted from appearing in such paper/practical at a subsequent examination and will be declared to have passed the examination if he passes in the remaining paper/practicals and aggregate of that examination under the rules in para (10) above.

However the candidate may be permitted to reappear for the entire examination (theory/practical). In such cases, the entire result of the previous examination will be treated as cancelled.

For deciding whether a candidate has secured 50% of the aggregate marks obtained in the whole examination the marks of the candidate at the previous examination in the paper/practical or papers/practicals in which he is exempted shall be carried over.

13. (i) An unsuccessful examinee who has failed in not more than two theory papers or two practicals, or one theory paper and one practical, shall be placed in the compartment in such two theory papers or two practicals, or one theory paper and one practical provided that he has obtained the minimum of total aggregate marks at the examination. A candidate shall be declared successful at the examination if he obtains the prescribed minimum pass marks at a subsequent examination, compartment.

(ii) If a candidate fails to obtain the prescribed minimum of 50% marks in the total aggregate but passes in all theory papers, practicals, sessional, he shall also be placed in the compartment in not more than two theory papers in which he has secured the minimum marks. If the candidate obtained the minimum pass marks in each paper at subsequent examination and further obtains the minimum total aggregate marks required for passing the examination he shall be declared successful at the examination.

14. Candidate placed in the compartment in accordance with provisions of para, 13 above will be allowed to appear in the theory paper or practical concerned at subsequent examination until he clears the compartment. Provided further that if he appears in two

compartmental paper/practicals and obtains pass marks in only one of them, he will be required to appear only in remaining theory paper or practical in subsequent examination until he clears the compartment in that paper or practical.

15. Notwithstanding any thing contained in Ordinance No. 6 candidate who is placed in the compartment in accordance with the provisions of para 13 above, shall be provisionally admitted to the next higher class, provided he has prosecuted a regular course of study in the higher class for one academic year. He will also be permitted provisionally to appear at the next higher class examination in all subjects and practicals in addition to appearing in the lower class examination in compartmental subjects. However in case he fails to clear the compartmental subject of the lower class, his result of higher class examination will be announced as usual, but he will not be eligible to seek admission to the next higher class until he clears the compartmental subjects of the lower class.

16. (a) The division at the examination shall be awarded on the following basis :-

50% and above but less than 65% of the total aggregate marks

II division

65% and above but less than 75% of the total aggregate marks

I division

75% and above of the total aggregate marks - I division with honors

- (b) Candidate, who passed any of the B.E. (III, IV & V) examination after availing exemptions under Para 12 or after being placed in compartment under para 13 above, shall be placed in the pass division (c) Notwithstanding the provision in (b) above if candidate is placed in the compartment of the B.E. (Final Year) examination in accordance with Para 13 (i) above and subsequently passes the examination in the first attempt, only the minimum pass marks in the compartmental subjects will be taken into account for arriving at his total aggregate marks and he will be placed in the division he is entitled to in accordance with para 16(c) such candidate will not be ———.

**RELATING TO FIRST, SECOND, THIRD AND FINAL
EXAMINATION FOR PART TIME FOUR YEAR DEGREE
COURSE**

1. There shall be four examinations for part-time Degree course as follows:-

- (i) First examination for the part time B.E. Degree. (Part Time Four Year Course)
- (ii) Second Examination for - do -
- (iii) Final Examination for - do -

2. (i) Each examination will be conducted as per scheme detailed in appendix 'A'

- (ii) During each calendar year there will be one main examination in April/May followed by a second examination in July/August, the exact dates will however be notified by the Academic Council.

3. A person seeking admission to the First Examination for the Post Diploma B.E. Degree (Part Time 4 year Course) and subsequently satisfactorily prosecuted the required course of study of the First year for one academic session.

- (a) Diploma of the C.G. Board of Technical Examination Raipur in the relevant branch or any other Diploma Examination recognized by C.G. Board of Technical Education.

- (b) Two years of Practical experience after passing the Diploma in Govt. under taking or in any reputed Industry. Unpaid training will not be considered for this purpose.

- (c) A student will be eligible for admission to part time B.E. Course only if, his percentage marks in the final diploma examination is not less than 60% Admission will be given on the basis of merit. The merit list will be prepared by adding the marks in the following way:-

- (i) Percentage of Final Year Diploma Examination.
- (ii) Marks obtained in interview out of 25.
- (iii) Marks awarded for additional experience at the rate of 1 mark for each additional year of experience subject to the maximum of 3 marks over the minimum required 2 years of experience.

- (d) A person seeking admission to the Second Examination for the Part Time B.E. Degree shall have passed the Ist Examination of the Part Time Four Year Degree Course of the Pt. Ravishankar Shukla University; Raipur satisfactorily prosecuted the required course of study of one academic session of First Year. Similarly for admission to Third and Forth year, the candidates should have passed the immediately receding examination of the Part Time Four Year Degree Course of Pt Ravishankar Shukla University, Raipur and have satisfactorily prosecuted the required course of study of one academic session in the appropriate class at the Govt. College of Engineering and Technology. Raipur.

4. (i) -----

(a) Certificate of good conduct from his employers and Principal.

(b) Certificates of fitness from the Principal to present himself at the examination.

(c) Certificate of having prosecuted a regular course of study from the Principal, and

(d) Certificate of possessing the minimum academic qualifications prescribed for appearing at the examination concerned.

(ii) For the purpose of this paragraph, the fitness of a student to present himself at the examination shall be judged by the Part Time Degree Course Principal:-

(iii) (a) The record of his academic work in the college.

(b) His intellectual capacity, and

(c) The time at his disposal before the commencement of the examination for making up the deficiencies if any in his/her studies.

(iv) The certificates required by this paragraph shall reach the Registrar not later than four weeks before the date for the commencement of the written examination.

Explanation -

Prosecution of regular course of study means:

Attendance of at least eighty five percent of the lectures delivered and practical classes held during the year and in case of subjects for which practical work and Sessional work are prescribed; completion of eighty five percent of such work during the academic year.

Note: For special reasons such as prolonged ——— deficiency in percentage of attendance , not exceeding fifteen percent of the total number of lectures delivered and practical/Sessional held in each subject, may be condoned by the Kulpati on the recommendation of the Principal.

5. On the report of the Principal of the college the Executive Council may refuse admission to or exclude any candidate from examination prescribed by the Academic Council and such report should reach the Registrar not later than three weeks before the commencement of the examination.

6. (i) Every application for admission to the relevant examination of the Part Time Four Year Degree Course shall be in the form prescribed by the Academic Council and shall reach the Registrar not later than three weeks before the commencement of the examination. It shall be accompanied by the prescribed fee.

(ii) Application for admission to the examination as ex students shall be made in the forms prescribed by the Academic Council and shall reach the Registrar together with the examination fee, and such additional fees as may be prescribed, by the date prescribed by Pt. Ravishankar Shukla University, Raipur.

entitled to a refund of the fee except in ——— the Registrar as per the existing Practice cases of sickness etc., a part of the fee — be refunded by the Registrar not earlier than and not later than 30 days from the date of commencement of examination.

7. (a) Every candidate shall be examined in the subjects as mentioned in the scheme of examination pertaining to the relevant year (see Appendix 'A')

(b) The written papers and practical tests and the maximum marks for each paper and text shall be as detailed in Appendix 'A'

8. The minimum marks which an examinee shall obtain in order to pass the examination shall be as follows:-

- (i) Thirty five percent of the maximum marks allotted to each written paper.
- (ii) 60% of the maximum Sessional marks allotted to each paper/practical.

- (iii) Fifty percent of the total marks allotted to each practical tests (including viva-test).
- (iv) Fifty percent of the marks in the aggregate at the whole examination.

9. (i) An examinee who has obtained at the Examination the minimum marks prescribed by paragraph (9) shall be declared to be successful at the examination and placed in the division as follows :-

- (ii) An examinee who obtains an aggregate of fifty (50) percent marks and above but less than sixty five (65) percent shall be placed in the second division.
- (iii) An examinee who obtains an aggregate of sixty five percent marks and above but less than seventy five percent shall be placed in the first division.

(iv) An examinee who obtains an aggregate marks of seventy five percent and above shall be placed in first Division with distinction provided candidate passes the full examination (Theory Practical) in one sitting at the main examination.

(v) The names of the first three successful candidates in main examination who obtain First Class & shall be declared in order of Merit.

(vi) An examinee, who fails by a total of not more than three marks in not more than two papers or two practical tests or one paper and one practical test in any B.E. (Part-Time) Examinations, but secures more than the minimum aggregate marks, shall given three grace marks to enable him to pass the examination.

(vii) The Kulpati may award one grace marks in case the candidate is failing or missing a division by one mark, where the deficiency is so condoned, one mark shall nowhere be added.

Provided that the benefit under the paragraph (VII) shall not be allowed to enable a candidate to get the benefit under paragraph (VI) above.

10. The following shall be eligible to be declared as compartmental candidates :-

- (a) One who has failed in not more than two subjects (Papers), Practicals i.e., either two theory or two Practicals or combination of one theory and one practical) and has an aggregate ——— become at least 50% by substituting minimum pass marks in the subjects (Paper-Practical) in which he/she has failed.

(b) Such a candidate shall be eligible to appear in the two examinations immediately following the examination in which he was declared to be eligible there after; he shall be required to appear in all papers and practicals at the next examination.

(c) Such a candidate shall be declared to have passed the examination if he secures the minimum pass marks in the subjects. Division shall be awarded on the basis of the actual marks secured in the Paper/practical.

11. (a) Following shall be eligible to appear in second full examination to be held as far as possible in July/August every year :-

(i) Compartmental candidates as defined under (10) above.

(ii) Candidates who failed in the main examination.

(iii) Candidates who were admitted to the main examination but who for any reason did not appear in the main examination.

(b) Every candidate desirous of appearing at the second Examination shall submit an application as indicated in this ordinance with requisite fees. The results of candidates appearing in the second examination shall be declared in accordance with the provision of the ordinance.

(c) Such candidates as are eligible to appear in the second examination may be provisionally admitted to the next higher class and their attendance in the higher class shall be counted in case they are declared successful at the second examination. If the candidate fails at the examination, the admission to the higher class shall be cancelled and the candidate shall revert to the lower class.

12. (i) The Registrar shall issue an admission card in favour of a candidate if,

(a) The application of the candidate is complete in all particulars in accordance with the provisions applicable to him and is in order;

(b) The candidate is eligible for admission to examination, and

(c) The fees as prescribed have been paid by the candidate.

(ii) Where the practical examination is held earlier than examination in theory papers, a candidate shall not be deemed to have been admitted to the examination until he is issued an admission card for appearing in the examination.

(iii) A candidate shall not be admitted to the examination hall unless he produces the admission card before the Superintendent Examination Centre or the invigilator or satisfies such officers that it shall be produced.

13. The Principal of the college may detain a regular candidate from Taking an exemption if he does not pay outstanding college dues, or does not return the college property and all the articles or does not pay the cost thereof in case of loss by 15th of _____ preceding the examination or if the conduct of the student has been unsatisfactory between the time of submission of his application form to the Registrar _____ for admission to the examination and the date of commencement of the examination.

14. **Scrutiny of marks or revaluation**

A candidate whose result has been declared, may apply to the Registrar, for scrutiny of his marks in the written papers and the rechecking of his result, or for revaluation of his answer books, but not more than two, within 30 days of the declaration of his result according to the provision laid down in the Ordinance No. 5 and 6 The fee for scrutiny of marks shall be Rs. 8/- for one subject/paper and Rs. 20/- for all subjects, and for revaluation Rs. 100/- per answer book.

15. The degree awarded shall be known as B.E. (Part Time) degree.

ORDINANCE No. 58.

SCALE OF PAY OF PROFESSORS, READERS AND LECTURERS

1. The revised scales of pay of Professors, Readers and Lecturers in the Schools of Studies and University Teaching Departments as notified by the State Government vide Education Department memo No. F 7/14/75/E-5/20 dated 29th May, 1980 shall be as stated below:-

Provided that the salaries of the following categories of teachers shall be fixed in accordance with the rules of the Government concerned, viz.:-

- (i) Government servants on deputation to the University and
- (ii) Superannuated Government servants re-employed by the University after their superannuation.

Provided further that:-

- (i) Teachers who do not opt for the old scale or revised scales of pay as given above within the date prescribed by the Executive Council shall be deemed to have opted for the revised scale of pay as given above :
- (ii) Teachers who opt for the old scale of pay as given in revised ordinance No. 43 (now repealed) shall draw salary prescribed in revised ordinance No. 43 (now repealed).

2. The above pay scales shall be applicable retrospectively with effect from 1st April, 1976.

3. Other conditions as laid down by the Government of Chhattisgarh Education Department, Raipur for introduction of these pay scales vide letter No. F 7/14/75/E-5/20 dated the 29th May, 1980 shall also be applicable.

ORDINANCE No. 59

(B.Ed.) Examination

BACHELOR OF EDUCATION

1. A person, who had obtained a Bachelor's Degree of the University or a degree recognised as equivalent thereto shall be eligible for admission to the examination for the degree of Bachelor of Education.
2. For admission to examination, a candidate shall apply to the Registrar of the University on a prescribed form through the Principal of the College and produce the following certificates signed by the Principal of the College, viz certificate of:
 - i. Good conduct.
 - ii. Fitness to present himself at the examination.
 - iii. Having attended the prescribed course in physical training or in exceptional case any other activities permitted by the Principal.
 - iv. Having completed satisfactorily the course in pedagogical drawing.

The University examination in theory papers will be held in April and the University examination in Practical will be conducted in February/ March in the same session.

- 3.1 The examination shall consist of two parts, namely -

Part-I Theory 600 marks

Part-II Practical/ Internal Assessment 600 marks

Scheme of evaluation is given in the beginning of the syllabus.

The classification of division in theory (Part-I) will be as under:

A candidate securing 198 marks in the aggregate shall be placed in the third division in this part, 270 marks in the second division and 360 marks in the first division.

Part-II

"In order to pass in this part, a candidate will require to secure atleast 50% in the aggregate in each part [Part-II(A) and Part(B)]. However, every student has to take part in each item of Part-II. A candidate securing 300 marks in this part will be placed in the third division, 360 marks in the second division, and 480 marks in the first division."

3.2 Eligibility -

- 3.2.1 Candidate with atleast 50% marks either in the Bachelor's Degree and/or in the Master's degree or any other qualification equivalent thereto are eligible for admission to the programme.
- 3.2.2 There shall be relaxation of marks/reservation of seats for candidates belonging to SC/ST/OBC communities and other categories as per the Rules of the Central/State Government/UT administration concerned.

3.3 Admission Procedure

Admission shall be made on merit on the basis of marks obtained in the qualifying examination and /or in the entrance examination or any other selection process as per the policy of the State Government/UT Administration and the University.

4. Internal Assessment of each candidate is to be carried throughout the course and a cumulative record of each candidate is to be maintained.

5. Provision has to be made by each college for tutorial classes as given in the curriculum and each candidate is required to attend the tutorial classes and carry out the assignments.
6. A cumulative record is to be maintained for each student teacher and the entries are to be taken for internal assessment.
7. Each student teacher is required to attend prayer of the College under the community activities and each pupil-teacher has to take part in co-curricular activities.
8. Library study is compulsory for each student teacher and a record is to be maintained by the college.
9. The scope of the subjects shall be indicated in the prospectus.
10. There will be an internal choice in questions. Questions will be asked unit wise.
11. If any student is absent in any activities of the college whose marks are included in the University Examination shall be declared fail. However 25% marks necessary to obtain in each activities to pass the exam.
12. If any student could not get 75% attendance he can appear only when he will complete his attendance next year after seeking admission.
13. If any student is fail in any one of the papers or in any one item of the practical part, he can appear in paper or item in the next exam.
14. Every student has to conduct 8 Psychology practicals and have to submit a practical copy/ record. An External Examiner will examine the students and will take viva voce examination.
15. Every student has to choose one craft under productive works. An external examiner will conduct the practical Examination in productive and will take viva-voce examination on this.
16. Every student has to select two school subjects for teaching practice. They have to complete 20 lessons in each subject or they have to complete 20 lessons in micro teaching plan and 10 lessons in each subject in different schools subjects.

Ordinance No. 60
Master of Laws (LL.M.) Examination

1. The course for the Degree of Master of Laws under this Ordinance shall extend over a period of two academic years comprising four semesters in all, for each semester there shall be held an examination in the papers prescribed for the said semester concerned. The semesters shall be called as:

LL.M. Part I - First Semester

LL.M. Part I - Second Semester

LL.M. Part II - First Semester

LL.M. Part II - Second Semester

2. LL.M. First Semester shall be made in the month of July every year and the semester examination shall be held in the month of January of the following year.

Examinations for all the Semester shall be held twice a year, namely, January/February and July/August.

3. (a) A candidate who after having passed the three years, course for the degree of Bachelor of Laws of the University or of any other statutory University recognised as equivalent thereto, with atleast 60% of marks has prosecuted a regular course of prescribed study for one semester session in the University Department of Law or any college affiliated to the University, shall be eligible to appear at the LL. M. Part I, Semester Examination.

(b) A candidate who after having passed the LL.M. Part - I, 1st Semester Examination of the University has prosecuted a regular course of prescribed study for one semester session in the University Department of Law, or in an affiliated College shall be eligible to present himself/herself at the LL. M. Part I, Second Semester Examination.

(c) A candidate who, after having Passed LL.M. Part I Second Semester Examination of this University has prosecuted a regular course of prescribed study for one semester session in the University Department of Law or College affiliated to the University shall be eligible to appear at LL.M. Part II, First Semester Examination.

(d) A candidate who after having passed the LL.M. Part - II First Semester Examination of this University has prosecuted a regular course of study for one semester session in the University Department of Law or a College affiliated to the University shall be eligible to appear at the LL.M. Part - II Second Semester Examination.

4. (a) No candidate shall be permitted to appear for any of the LL. M. Semester examination unless he has attended atleast 75% of the total number of Lectures and seminars held during the semester session.

(b) Every Student of the College/University Teaching Department seeking admission to the examination shall submit through the Principal or Head of the Department as the case may be application on prescribed form, together with necessary fees and following certificates from the Principal/Head of the Department, viz. certificates of:

- (i) Good Conduct.
- (ii) Fitness to present, himself/herself at the examination, and
- (iii) Of having ended the class teacher's seminars, etc. during the session atleast the minimum number prescribed by sub-para (a) above.

(a) No candidate who has appeared in a LL. M. Semester Examination but has not been declared successful there at in accordance with the provisions contained in the following sub para shall be eligible for admission to the next higher semester class examination.

(b) In order to declare successful at any of the LL. M. Semester Examinations every candidate will have to obtain atleast 40% marks in individual papers and atleast 50% marks aggregate.

Provided that for the purpose of declaration of the result of candidate appearing LL.M. Part-II Second Semester Examination the marks obtained by them in the written examination as well as the viva-voce shall be taken into account.

A Successful candidate shall be assigned division on the basis of the marks obtained by him/her in all the four semester examinations taken together. Those who secure 60% marks or more shall be placed in the First Division. All other successful candidates shall be placed in the Second Division.

A candidate who has been declared unsuccessful at a semester examination may at his/her option re-appear at it subsequently at an ex-student without being require to attend regular course of study again for the same semester subject to the condition that such a candidate shall abide by and shall be governed by the provision of this and other Ordinances applicable.

5.

The Executive Council shall publish the results of the examination as soon as possible for it.

SCHEMES OF THE EXAMINATION

1. (a) Every candidate appearing for LL.M. Part-I First Semester shall be examined in the following two papers of 100 marks each.

Paper-1 - Legal and Constitutional History of India.

Paper-2 - Constitutional Law of India

(b) Every candidate appearing for LL.M. Part-I Second Semester examination shall be examined in the following two papers.

Paper-1 - Jurisprudence and Legal Theory

Paper-2 - Legislation Principles, Methods and Interpretation

(c) Every candidates appearing for LL.M. Part-II First Semester Examination shall be examined in the following papers of 100 marks each.

Paper I and Paper - II of any of the group mentioned in subpara (f) of this paragraph.

(d) Every candidate appearing for LL.M. Part-II, Second Semester examination shall be examined in the following papers each comprising of 100 marks.

Paper - III and IV of the same group, which was offered in the First Semester of LL.M. Part - II Examination.

Provided that the Head to Department of Law in the College or in the Teaching Department of the University if he is satisfied about the ability of a regular student, in view of his/her performance at earlier semester permit the student to offer dissertation in lieu of one of the papers prescribed for the Semester examination.

(e) In addition to the written examination as prescribed in the preceding sub-para every candidate appearing for the LL.M. Part -II, Second Semester Examination shall also appear for a Viva Voce Examinaiton 100 marks. This will be held before a Board of three examiners of whom two will be external and one internal. The absence of one External Examiner may, however, be condoned by the Kulpati. If it is caused due to unavoidable circumstances, ordinarily the Head of Department of Law will be the Internal Examiner.

(f) The following are the Groups of papers, any one of which shall be offered by the candidates appearing for LL.M. Part -II, Examination, viz.

ORDINANCE NO. 60

The Ordinance provides for admission, examination and other incidental matters relating to the Master of Social Work. Two year (Four Semesters) Full time Program spread over four semester, two semester in the First year and two semesters in the second year.

1. Name of the course

Bastar University under choice based credit system (CBCS) is offering a two year MSW (Master of Social Work) Degree Course (Semester Pattern). The term 'credit' is used to describe the quantum of syllabus for various programmes in terms of hours of study. Core and Elective courses are a set of compulsory courses required for each programme. The minimum credit requirement for a two-year masters programme is 90.

2. Eligibility for Admission

A candidate seeking admission to the first semester of the course shall be required to:-

- a. Possess a Bachelor's or a Master Degree in any discipline with at least second division (at least 50% marks in aggregate). No relaxation can be granted in 50% in aggregate except to those who belong to SC/ST/OBC they will be given a relaxation of 5% marks in the minimum of their qualifying examination. Their seats will be reserved as per M.P. Govt. rules.
- b. The Candidate who are in service willing to join this course, will have to produce a no-objection certificate with two years leave from his/her employer. In case he/she fails to produce the same latest at the time of Interview, his/her candidature will not be considered.

3. Admission to first semester shall be made on the basis of an admission process consisting of written test and personality test, carrying a total weightage of 100 marks. The detailed rules of selection procedure through the written test and personality test will be framed and notified by the M.S.W. Admission committee of the school of studies in Social work year to year.
4. An applicant for the M.S.W. examination prosecuting a full-time course of study leading to the Master of social works shall not be permitted to take up any other examination or course, simultaneously.
5. No person shall be admitted to M.S.W. examination if he/she has already passed M.S.W. examination or any equivalent examination of any University or Statutory body. However, this restriction shall not be applicable to Diploma holders.
6. The candidate who has passed any part of M.S.W. program of any University or Institution will not be admitted to M.S.W. Program of this University on migration basis.
7. Each candidate will have to complete the minimum 75% attendance in each semester.
8. Each candidate will have to go for field work and submit a field work report relating to any rural area/organization after the first and second semester. This report will have to be submitted by him/her in second and third semester for evaluation.
9. In IV semester, each candidate will have to carryout a project work on any topic approved by faculty council of the department of Social work and submit his project report for valuation at least 10 days before the commencement of fourth semester examination.
10. Age restriction will be according to Govt. of M.P. Rules for admission in regular course of studies.

11. Examination

- i. Subject to the provisions of this ordinance, the scheme of examination and the syllabus and text books, will be prescribed or recommended in connection with any subject for any of the examination covered by this ordinance and the conditions on which the students shall be admitted to such examination, shall be in accordance with the provisions made by the Academic Council after considering the recommendations of concerned Board of Studies and the Faculty of Management.
- ii. Each examination shall be regarded as a separate unit for the purpose of working out the result of the candidate. The result of each examination shall be worked out separately even if he/she has appeared at the course in which he/she failed previously, along with the course in which he/she is appearing for the first-time for getting success, he/she must have secured

REVISED ORDINANCE No. 62

DIPLOMA IN PHOTOGRAPHY

1. Candidates possessing Bachelor's degree from a recognized University or three-year Diploma in Engineering from a recognized polytechnic shall be eligible for admission to the Diploma in photography course of this University.

2. The students of this course will be treated as casual students and shall not be entitled to the privileges and facilities accorded to the regular students. However, these students may appear at any other examination of the University along with the examination of this course.

3. The candidates admitted to this course shall be required to pay the following fees:-

4. The Diploma in Photography examination shall consist of two parts:

- (1) Written Examination consisting of one theory paper carrying 100 marks.
- (2) Practical Examination carrying 200 marks.

The break-up of the marks in the practical examination shall be as follows:

- (a) Sessional marks to be awarded on the basis of actual performance during the relevant academic session as evinced from the practical record book - 100 marks.
- (b) Practical Examination of 18 hours duration spread over a period of three days - 100 marks.

5. In order to pass at the examination a candidate will be required to secure at least 50 percent marks in theory and practical separately. Candidates securing 60 percent marks in the aggregate shall be declared to have passed the examination with merit and the remaining successful candidates shall be declared to have passed the examination in pass division.

DIPLOMA IN ELECTRONICS

1. Candidates possessing Bachelor of Engineering degree or a Bachelor of Science degree with physics from a recognized University or three year Diploma in Electronics or Electrical Engineering from a recognized polytechnic shall be eligible for admission to the post graduate Diploma in Electronics course.

2. The students of this course will be treated as casual students and shall not be entitled to the privileges and facilities accorded to the regular students. However, these students may appear at any other examination of the University along with the examination of this course.

3. The candidates admitted to this course shall be required to pay the following fees:-

Candidates securing 60% or more marks in the aggregate of the written papers, practical and project work shall be declared to have passed the examination with merit. Remaining successful candidates shall be declared to have pass the examination in pass division.

REVISED ORDINANCE No. - 67

POST GRADUATE DIPLOMA IN COMPUT
APPLICATION

1. The minimum qualification for application for the admission to PGDCA course as under -

"A candidates possessing Bachelor's Degree of this University or an examination recognized equivalent thereto shall be eligible for admission".

2. The student of this course will be treated as regular student and shall not be entitled to all the privileges and facilities accorded to the regular students of other courses.

3. This Diploma shall be Full time course of study. The duration of this course will be extended to ONE YEAR and this shall be sub-divided into two semesters.

4. The admission to PGDCA course of study shall be made on merit, to be decided on the basis of written test organized by this University.

5. The candidates admitted to the PGDCA course shall have to pay the course fees in addition to other fees as prescribed by this University. All the fees etc. can be changed by this University from time to time.

6. The total intake capacity to PGDCA course for the University S.o.S. in Computer Science and for affiliated Colleges shall be decided by the University, from time to time

7. The students admitted to PGDCA course shall not be permitted to appear at any other Examination of the University

8. There shall be University Examinations conducted by the University at the end of each semester on the basis of course contents and scheme of Examination as may be prescribed by the University from time to time.

9. At the end of each semester there will be examination in 3 theory papers and two Practical papers. The theory paper shall be of 3 hrs duration and practical paper of 4 hrs. Project will be based on Viva Voce and the performance of the project work.
10. There shall be 100 marks for each course and depending on the marks obtained by candidate, each candidates shall be placed in the following grade as shown below to show his/her performance :

1. The Diploma Course will be of full time one year duration. The diploma in Materials Management will be under the 'Business Management & Applied Economics Board of Studies' and Diploma in Accountancy will be under 'Commerce Board of Studies'.

2. The above diploma courses can be started by college having Post-graduate Teaching atleast eight teachers in Commerce. The Maximum under the students in each Diploma Course will be thirty; One Academic Year.

3. A candidate who after taking his/her Bachelor's degree or Master's degree in atleast second class in Commerce, Arts, Social Science, Agriculture and Engineering Faculty of the University or any other statutory University in India or a candidate, who has obtained Diploma in Civil, Mechanical, Electrical Engineering, Mining and Metallurgy from C.G. Board of Technical Education, Raipur and has the experience of three year working in any undertaking has completed a regular course of study in an affiliated College or in the Teaching Department of the University for one Academic Year shall be eligible for appearing at the Diploma Examination.

Candidates studying for post-graduate Degrees in Commerce and those engaged in research work in Commerce may also join this course simultaneously, Provisions of Ordinance No. 6 will apply to the candidates.

4. The examination shall consist of five written papers each carrying 100 marks of 3 hours duration and internal evaluation of 20 marks in each paper and a Viva-voce test of half hour duration for each candidate carrying 100 marks and 'Study Report' shall carry 100 marks.

The Candidates will be required to submit the study-report based on actual working of 90 days in any Industrial undertaking and on the basis of it he is to submit study report

which will be evaluated by the external and internal examiner at the time of Viva-voce jointly.

5. Candidate securing atleast 36% marks in each written paper and 48% marks in each internal evaluation 48% marks in Study Report and Viva-voce taken together and 48% in the aggregate, shall be declared to have passed in second division and those securing 60% or more marks in aggregate shall be declared to have passed in first division.

6. A candidate failing at the Diploma examination will not be required to appear in a written paper, internal evaluation or study report and Viva-voce provided he/she has secured 48% in that written paper of internal evaluation or study report and Viva-voce.

ORDINANCE No. 69

POST GRADUATE DIPLOMA EXAMINATIONS IN PSYCHOLOGY

General Rules:

1. The P.G. Diploma Examinations are advanced courses of full time one academic year and will be under the Board of Studies in Psychology.
2. The Maximum number of students in each P.G. Diploma Course will be twenty only.
3. The P.G. Diploma shall be conferred after the candidate has adequate training and specified instructions for one academic session and passed the prescribed examination.

Subjects of Award:

1. P.G. Diploma in Personal Management and Industrial Relations, abbreviated as (P.M.I.R.) shall run by under self financing scheme
2. P.G. Diploma in Psychological Guidance and Counseling abbreviated as (P.G.C.).

Eligibility for Admission to PMIR Course:

1. A candidate eligible under either of the three conditions shall be admitted by selection.
 - I. P.G. Degree atleast in second Division of this University or equivalent to it from any other University in either of the following disciplines:
 - (i) Psychology.
 - (ii) Sociology with Industrial Sociology/Labour welfare.
 - (iii) Commerce, with Banking/Business Management.
 - (iv) Economics with Industrial Economics.
 - (v) Geography with paper having bearing on Industry.
 - (vi) Public Administration
 - (vii) Political Science with Public Administration.

Or

II. Diploma in Banking/Business Management of this University or equivalent to it from any other University.

Or

III. Bachelor of Engineering.

Or

IV. Bachelor of Law.

Eligibility for admission To P.G.C. Course

A candidate eligible under either of the three conditions shall be admitted by selection

I. P.G. Degree atleast in Second Division of this University or equivalent to it from any other University in P.G.

Or

II. P.G. Degree in Education (i.e. M.Ed.) with Second Division of this University or any other University

Or

III. P.G. Degree in Home Science with Child Development in Second Division of this University or any other University

Courses of Studies and Examination Systems:

For the two P.G. Diplomas (namely, PMIR and PGC) the courses of studies and evaluation systems will be as per the decisions of the Board of Studies in Psychology taken from time, under the caption - "Syllabus for P.G. Diploma in PMIR and PGC."

ORDINANCE No. 70

MASTER OF PHYSICAL EDUCATION (BY SUMMER COURSE)

1. A candidate meeting the requirements for admissions to the first year of M.P.Ed. (Summer Course) may register, provided he has at least 3 years of experience in the field after passing the B.P.Ed./D.P.ED./B.P.E. Examinations. The experience may include teaching in a Secondary School/College/University or holding administrative and supervisory Posts in Physical Education or sports in Educational institutions or other approved agencies at the time of registration.

The candidate for registration shall be in service and the application shall be duly forwarded by the appointing authority.

Physical Education teachers holding a Certificate in Physical Education and later obtaining a degree or Post graduate diploma (One full academic year duration) in Physical Education shall have a minimum of 5 years experience in total including atleast 2 years experience after obtaining the degree of Post-Graduate diploma in Physical Education, subject to being selected on admission criteria prescribed by the University from time to time.

2. Such candidates shall study privately under the guidance of the University and attend a regular summer course of 10 weeks duration each for three years within a period of six years of their first registration. Regular course of study shall mean attendance of atleast 90% of total number of working days of the session concerned and shall include lectures, practicals, seminars, projects, library sessions and activity classes.

3. The examination for M.P.Ed. by Summer Course shall consist of 15 written paper as prescribed in the syllabus Five papers shall be offered in each year, each paper carrying 100 marks. In III year of the course, a candidate be permitted to opt, for a Dissertation carrying 150 marks in lieu of Paper XV subject to his obtaining atleast 55% marks in his I & II year Exam. Besides the University examination, sessional grades shall be added to each paper separately out of 50 marks. A candidate must obtain for a pass atleast 40% marks in each written paper in the final examination and also obtain at least 48% marks in the aggregate including the

sessional marks in each year. Minimum of pass percentage for the sessional grades is 50% In part II (Sport Specialisation) in M.P.Ed. (SC)II, the candidates must obtain 50% marks.

There shall be final examination in part II of the year to be conducted by Internal & External examiners and each candidate must obtain for pass at least 50% marks in this examination, M.P.Ed. examination part II shall be considered to be equivalent to one theory paper for A.T.K.T. purposes.

The final examination in Dissertation for third year shall consist of the evaluation of the Dissertation by two (one-External one Internal) Examiner, who shall value the Dissertation out of a maximum of 75 marks each. The supervisor shall be the internal examiner.

The marks obtained by a candidate in all papers of II years shall count together for place on the pass list of the final year examination. No division shall be assigned on the basis of each year's result, Division for M.P. Ed. (SC) shall be awarded on the basis of cumulative marks in part I and II (Theory & Sport Specialization). Division shall be assigned on the following basis -

- (i) First Division - 60% and above of the aggregate marks.
- (ii) Second Division - 48% and above but below 60% of the aggregate marks.

4. A candidate after passing the First and Second year of the course shall be admitted to the Second and Third year of the course respectively. However, a candidate failing in not more than three papers in any year shall be permitted to join the next class in which case he shall have to appear in the papers in which he had failed in the previous class along with the papers of the current year provided that no candidate shall be admitted to the Third year class unless he has passed all the paper of the First year.
5. Sessional marks obtained by a candidate shall be carried over if a candidate fails in the final examination in any or all papers of any year and appears as an ex-student. If the candidate seeks readmission as a regular student, the sessional marks previously obtained for these papers shall stand cancelled.
6. A candidate shall pass the final year within Six years from the date of the commencement of his first year.

7. When a candidate has failed in the examination but has obtained pass marks in the Dissertation the Dissertation marks may be carried forward at his option to the prescribed limit of 6 years as specified above. If a candidate fails in Dissertation but secures pass marks in written papers, the candidate shall be permitted to complete his requirement for Dissertation within the aggregate period of 6 years. The candidate shall submit three copies of Dissertation two weeks before the commencement of the concerned examination, failing which the students shall be declared fail in Dissertation and such candidate has to submit Dissertation in the next year as ex-student.

8. The Tuition, examination and other fees shall be as follows:-

ORDINANCE No. 71

POST GRADUATE DIPLOMA IN TOURISM & HOTEL MANAGEMENT

1. The duration of the course of Post Graduate Diploma in Tourism & Hotel Management shall be of one academic year. It shall be run by University Teaching Department or School of Studies of the University.
2. A candidate, who after obtaining his Bachelor's Degree of the University or an examination or a degree recognized as of equivalent thereto with atleast 45% marks and has completed a regular course of study shall be admitted to the examination for the Post Graduate Diploma in Tourism & Hotel Management. SC/ST candidates shall be eligible for relaxation as per Government rules.
3. The course structure along with the scheme of the examination shall be prescribed by the Board of Studies in Ancient Indian History, Culture and Archaeology.
4. Passing Marks for each paper shall be 33%
5. Those candidates who have secured at least 40% marks in aggregate shall be declared successful at the examination. A candidate obtaining 60% marks or more in the total aggregate shall be declared to have passed with merit.
6. An examinee who fails in any of one subject / paper either theory, professional development or field / project report may appear in that paper without being required to attend the further course of regular study in next examination on payment of fee prescribed by the University.
7. If a candidate who appeared and failed at the examination shall be eligible to appear as an ex-student and shall be exempted to submit field project report again or to appear in any internal paper / practical if he has passed the same. Marks of the project report/internal papers shall be carried over for determining the result.
8. The earlier Ordinance relating to Post Graduate Diploma in Tourism is repealed, the present ordinance shall be effective from the date on which it is approved by the ordination committee.
